It's Time to VOTE!

Follow the steps below to make sure that your vote is counted in the upcoming election

- ALL eligible CA voters who register by **October 19th** (visit <u>registertovote.ca.gov</u>) will receive a ballot by mail within 10 days. *If you miss the registration deadline you can STILL vote!*
- If you **VOTE-BY-MAIL** you can:
 - Drop off a completed ballot at a <u>24-hour Ballot Drop Box</u> (by 8:00p.m. on Nov. 3)
 - Mail your ballot (must be postmarked on or before Nov.
 3)
 - Return your ballot to an <u>Accessible Voting Location</u> or the Registrar of Voters' office (on or before Nov. 3)
 - No postage needed!
- You can also VOTE IN-PERSON at one of <u>Alameda</u> <u>County's Accessible Voting Locations</u> October 31 to November 3

Not Registered or Unsure? YOU CAN STILL VOTE!

- If you missed the October 19th deadline to register to vote in CA, you can vote conditionally at one of <u>Alameda County's</u> <u>Accessible Voting Locations</u> or at the Registrar of Voters (1225 Fallon Street, Oakland)
- You don't need to show ID, just give the last 4 numbers of your Social Security # or your Drivers License/ID number

Voting In-Person:

- For this election <u>Accessible Voting Locations</u> will replace traditional neighborhood polling places. You can find a list of Accessible Voting Locations in Alameda County at acvote.org/community/partnerships

A "yes" on Prop 15 would split- roll property taxes; residential properties would be taxed based on the purchase price, commercial and industrial properties(except Agriculture) would be taxed on the market value, INCREASING TAX REVENUE for cities and schools. Prop 20 would roll back state laws, to restrict early parole, expand felony charges for minor offenses and require collection of people's DNA for some misdemeanor charges. It will give prosecutors new flexibility to charge some property crimes of more than \$250, such as serial shoplifting and car theft, as felonies rather than misdemeanors. This would result in increased numbers of Californians in prison or jail.	A "yes" vote will amend the Costa- Hawkins law, to allow cities to pass rent control measures on almost all rental housing, as long as is more than 15 years old. There are still a few exemptions built into Prop. 21. For example, cities still wouldn't be able to cap rent increases by mom-and-pop landlords, who own no more than two small properties such as single-family homes or condos.	A "yes" on Prop 25 would end the Cash Bail system and replace it with a risk-based system based on a person's risk of not appearing at trial the higher the risk, the less likely they are to be released. This should result in fewer Californians in jail awaiting trial.

California Statewide Propositions

The following ballot measure applies to the County of Alameda:

Alameda County Measure W

- A "yes" on Measure W will provide funding to protect and house people experiencing homelessness.
- It will include housing assistance, mental health resources, job training and other services and supports.
- It will rase an estimated \$150 million per year through ½ cent increase in sales tax.
- Revenue will go to the Alameda County General Fund, and be guided by the Home Together plan adopted by the Alameda County Board of Supervisors

Exercise Your Right to VOTE!

If you are experiencing homelessness, you can (and should) register to vote!

You are eligible to vote in Alameda County if you are:

- A U.S. citizen
- A resident of Alameda County
- 18 years or older on Election Day (November 3, 2020)
- Not <u>currently</u> in prison or on parole for a felony conviction

The deadline to register to vote in the upcoming election is October 19, 2020
