Amy Garlin, MD is an Internal Medicine doctor and Infectious Disease specialist. She has worked as an HIV primary care and Street Medicine provider in Oakland and San Francisco since 2004. Between 2021 and 2023 she worked as a Medical Epidemiologist in Covid Response and as Medical Director of Communicable Disease Control for the City and County of San Francisco. As an Associate Clinical Professor at the UC

Berkeley School of Public Health she has taught clinical medicine to students in the UCB-UCSF Joint Medical Program and Public Health Immunology to interdisciplinary graduate students. Amy grew up in Alameda County, went to medical school at UCSF, and currently lives in Berkeley with her spouse and two daughters.

Summer Solstice Celebration 2023

On June 21st, Alameda County Health Care for the Homeless proudly co-sponsored the Summer Solstice Celebration of the Strength and Resilience of People Experiencing Homelessness in Alameda County. ACHCH Presented at the California Street Medicine Symposium Aislinn Bird, MD presented at the 5th Annual California Street Medicine Symposium in Los Angeles on August 18, 2023.

This conference brought together street medicine teams, people with lived expertise, community organizations, health plans, and community members to discuss street medicine best practices, the current state of street medicine in California, and goals for the future.



Dr. Bird was on a Street Medicine Panel with Dr. Ashraf Elmashat of USC and Dr. Coley King of Ventura County. They discussed the rewards and unique challenges of being street psychiatry providers, best practices regarding diagnosing in the field and how to increase access to psychiatric care on the streets.

It is a powerful testimony from an exceptional advocate, peer, mom, case manager, and friend to so many.



COVID-19 AND RESPIRATORY ILLNESS GUIDANCE Updated Guidance for Homeless

Shelters and Service Providers

Alameda County Health Care for the Homeless (ACHCH) continues to




work closely with our partners in the Alameda County Public Health Department (ACPHD) to coordinate and update our response. Positive cases (or "case counts"), hospitalizations, outbreaks, and wastewater monitoring all inform countywide responses to COVID-19. County Health Officer and ACHCH guidance will be posted on our webpages and actionable updates to guidance will be emailed to our provider community.

COVID-19, as well as other airborne respiratory illnesses such as influenza, RSV, colds, and many other viruses can spread among shelter and homeless services participants and staff. As we collectively work to ensure safer, healthier living environments in shelters and homeless programs, we recognize that COVID-19 is an ongoing presence, just like flu, RSV, and colds. Our shared goals are to prevent serious illness and death from respiratory diseases and support the health and wellness of all shelter residents and staff.
